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CSBG HIGHLIGHTS

Thanks to Idaho's CSBG Agencies:

288	Unemployed Idahoans obtained a job
220	Adults obtained their GED
3,880	Educational and Employment training opportunities were provided for Low-income individuals.
1,558	Idaho workers were able to maintain employments because agencies provided assistance such as special tools, appropriate work clothes and transportation.

Idaho saw an **increase** of over **1 million** pounds of food from 2014 to 2015. The increase can be attributed to an influx of USDA Bonus foods. Bonus foods are given to states and do not count against their already allocated food funds.

While we have had an increase in USDA foods across programs, the number of recipients has declined slightly at a rate similar to the declining need for other front line hunger programs; an indication that there is some recovery in the economy.

Additionally, Idaho agencies have experienced federal cuts, required under sequestration, that have reduced staff size, limited office hours and our ability to serve as many people in prior years.

TEFAP HIGHLIGHTS

NUTRITION AND EMERGENCY FOOD

Community Action brought **3,814,949** pounds of USDA Commodity food worth **\$2,717,013** into Idaho.

Idaho's CSBG agencies handed out over **370,000** food sacks from over six different funding sources to Idaho Families.

Over **78,000** Idahoans benefited from Idaho's CSBG agencies' nutrition programs.

More than **2,232,159** units of USDA Commodity food were distributed to low-income households through Community Action's statewide network of 112 partner emergency feeding organizations.

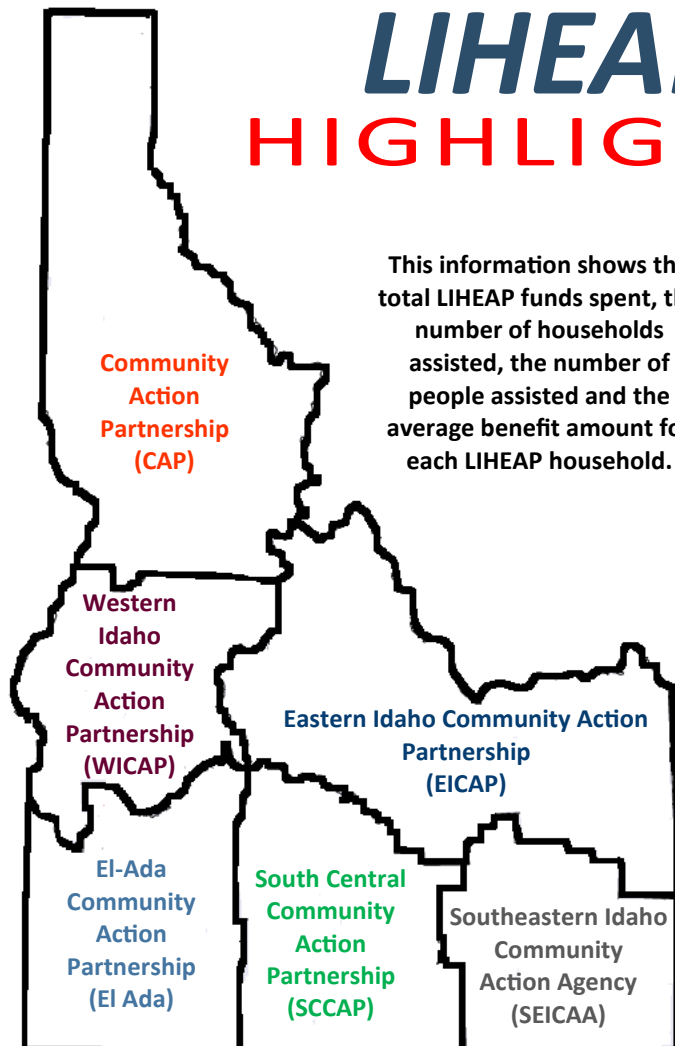
Weatherization is energy security. Throughout Idaho, our network provides weatherization services to low-income households.
